This year was filled with amazing mission moments and unprecedented need. Our youth are experiencing complex challenges in life that require quick and easy access to quality care and lots of compassion. From dog bites to COVID-19 testing--grief counseling to anger issues—with compassion, we treated them all. For hundreds of WWPS students it was THC they trusted and turned to.

This year was also full of funding successes as THC was the first organization in the Walla Walla Valley to be awarded a Group Health Foundation grant for \$225,000--distributed over three years. Additionally, THC was one of the first WA school-based health clinics (SBHC) awarded funds from the newly created state funding source supporting SBHC's who serve historically underserved populations. This state grant was in the amount of \$150,000. We were also grateful to be awarded a Sherwood Trust Core Grant of \$150,000. These last two grants are for the 2022-2023 year.

Our partnership with WWPS continues to be strong as we all understand the post-pandemic needs of our student population.

On behalf of THC staff, we are grateful for every supporter, whether you contributed \$25 or \$225,000, every dollar truly makes a difference in our community. Our mission is only possible through your support, and we are most fortunate to have such caring and compassionate friends.






